

Clarification on Labelling of feed exports to GB with the GB representative details

Under retained European Union (EU) law, manufacturers of feed products that are exported to GB must have a representative established in GB depending on the type of feed being exported. Feed classed as higher risk feeds outlined in the table below require a representative

1.	manufacturers of certain feed additives *
2.	manufacturers of certain novel protein source products
3.	manufacturers of premixtures containing certain feed additives
4.	compound feed manufacturers that incorporate the products mentioned above

*Feed additives typically requiring a GB representative include:

- trace elements
- vitamins
- carotenoids and xanthophylls
- micro-organisms and enzymes
- antioxidants with a maximum permitted level
- other additives with a maximum permitted level, not included in the above categories
- coccidiostats and histomonostats
- A full list of authorised feed additives is available from the <u>Register of regulated feed products for</u> <u>GB.</u>

If my feed falls into one of the above categories, how do I label my feed?

- 1. Appoint a GB representative
- 2. Include the GB representative's name and address on the label
- 3. Follow all other mandatory labelling as outlined in Regulation (EC) 767/2009 which is part of retained UK law must be followed

In general Feed Materials (such as grain) do not need a GB representative and in this case, include the EU manufacturers business name and address and feed hygiene numbers as per Regulation (EC) No 767/2009. If your feed material or feed is derived or contains products of animal origin as covered in EU Regulation 2019/2007, please check with DAFM on further and specific controls needed for your product.

Exporters should also read the DAFM trader notices 06/20 and 08/21, these provide further guidance and DAFM contact points.
